### Title: Joy to the World

Text: Psalm 96 and 98; Isaiah 52 - 54

#### **Introduction:**

Review of the last Sunday's devotional:

Reading: Psalm 96; Psalm 98; Isaiah 52 – 54

Joy to the World, written in 1719 by Isaac Watts (who studied at the Academy of the Rev. Thomas Rowe and became assistant minister of the Independent Church, Berry St. in London and in 1702 became the pastor, then in 1712 became the pastor of Abney Park) was based on Psalms 96 and 98 and was the most published

Christmas hymn in North America. When published by Pastor Watts in his "Psalms of David Imitated" (1719) this hymn was under the heading of "The Messiah's Coming and Kingdom."

In the Holy Scriptures there are TWO main streams of prophecy concerning the Messiah, or the Christ: 1) that of the Suffering Servant, 2) that of the Servant King!

# 1. The Suffering Servant: 1.1) Isaiah 52:14 – Isaiah 53:

- ~ Isaiah 52:14, "his appearance was so marred, beyond human semblance,"

## 2. The Servant King:

2.1) Isaiah 52:6 – 7, "Therefore my people shall know my name, therefore in that day they shall know that it is I who speak; here I am.
